The Jacobi Medallion

s President of the Associated Alumni in 1952, Dr. William M. Hitzig conceived the idea of commemorating the 100th anniversary of the founding of The Mount Sinai Hospital by honoring Mount Sinai physicians for distinguished achievement in the field of medicine or for extraordinary service to the alumni. Dr. Abraham Jacobi, after whom the medallion is named, was one of the early presidents of The Mount Sinai Hospital Medical Board and eventually became President of the AMA. He is credited with founding the specialty of pediatrics and, together with his wife Dr. Mary Putnam Jacobi, established the first pediatric clinic in the United States. A man of broad interests, humanistic philosophy, investigative acumen, and clinical skill, he stands as a model not only for Mount Sinai, but for the entire medical profession.



Burton A. Cohen, MD, MSH '79



Burton A. Cohen, MD, is an Associate Clinical Professor of Diagnostic, Molecular and Interventional Radiology at the Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai. Dr. Cohen has been associated with Mount Sinai since 1976, serving as Resident, then Chief Resident, in the Department of Radiology. He was on the full-time staff at Mount Sinai until 1985, serving as the First Chief of Computed Body Tomography. Since 1985, he has been in private practice as a partner at New York Medical Imaging Associates, a prominent radiology practice on the Upper East Side of Manhattan.

Dr. Cohen has been published in 39 peer-reviewed journals. He is the author of six book chapters and many abstracts and exhibits on a wide range of radiologic subjects. He has presented at a number of national meetings.

A proud alumnus of Icahn Mount Sinai, Dr. Cohen has been very active in the teaching programs at Mount Sinai and in the Alumni Association, including serving as its President. He is an engaged member of the Alumni Advisory Committee and served on the Admissions Committee of the medical school for 37 years.

Dr. Cohen has been recognized by his colleagues and named on many Best Doctors Lists, including *New York Magazine* (Castle and Connolly) and Top Doctors in the Metropolitan Area, the Region, and America. He has also been recognized many times by Super Doctors.

In May 2022, the Mount Sinai Alumni Association presented Dr. Cohen with its Master Clinician Award at its Alumni Reunion and Awards Ceremony in recognition of his distinguished service and achievements.

They have three children: Lauren, an Obstetrician and Gynecologist; Adam, an attorney whose wife Naomi is a Neonatologist, and Jonathan, an Oral Surgeon whose wife Anna Gribetz is a Social Work Manager in Oncology at Mount Sinai. Lakshmi A. Devi, PhD

Lakshmi A. Devi, PhD, is a Professor in the departments of Pharmacological Sciences, Psychiatry, and Neuroscience. She also serves as the Vice Chair of Education for the Department of Pharmacological Sciences at the Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai. Dr. Devi is an internationally recognized leader in molecular biology and pharmacology. She has authored more than 200 scientific research articles and mentored more than 90 trainees; many are now in faculty and/or leadership positions in academia and industry.

Dr. Devi's expertise in pharmacology, systems biology, and molecular neuroscience is a unique combination. Her investigations into the brain's response to drug abuse and opioid addiction are at the forefront of neuropharmacology research. Dr. Devi's groundbreaking studies have continuously received support from the National Institutes of Health. Previous grants have led to major scientific contributions to the fields of addiction research and neurodegenerative disorders.

More than a decade ago, Dr. Devi's group made a seminal discovery by demonstrating that membrane proteins such as G protein-coupled receptors form interacting complexes that also serve as novel therapeutic targets. Dr. Devi's group has identified compounds to target these complexes, and efforts are underway to develop these drugs for the treatment of chronic pain, substance abuse, and addiction. Ongoing research at the Devi Laboratory is also aimed at identifying receptors involved in the regulation of feeding, depression, and Alzheimer's disease.

Dr. Devi has won many honors and awards, including the National Institute of Drug Abuse Senior Scientist and Mentoring Award, the Dean's Award for Excellence in Basic Research, the NIH MERIT Award, the National Institute of Drug Abuse Senior Research and Mentorship Award, the Gaisman Frontiers in Biomedical Research Award, and the Outstanding Woman in Science Award from the New York chapter of the Association of Women in Science. In 2019, Mount Sinai bestowed Dr. Devi with an Endowed Professorship in Molecular Pharmacology. The following year, the Faculty Council presented her with its Lifetime Achievement Award.

Dr. Devi received her PhD from the University of Windsor in Ontario, Canada. She did her postdoctoral training at the Vollum Institute in Portland, Oregon, and at the Addiction Research Foundation in Palo Alto, California.

Marta Filizola, PhD, holds the Sharon and Frederick Klingenstein/Nathan Kase, MD Professorship and is a tenured professor in the departments of Pharmacological Sciences, Neuroscience, and Al and Human Health at the Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai, where she is also Dean of the Graduate School of Biomedical Sciences.

Dr. Filizola is renowned internationally for her contributions in the field of computational biophysics of membrane proteins, with a special emphasis on G Protein-Coupled Receptors. She has more than 20 years of experience in the application of computational and theoretical chemistry methods to biochemical and biomedical problems, and to rational drug design. She has co-authored several patents and published more than 130 research articles, reviews, and book chapters. Dr. Filizola has mentored more than 50 trainees, and as one of the few female investigators specialized in computational biophysics, she is extremely motivated to increase the participation of women performing research in quantitative sciences. Since joining the faculty at Icahn Mount Sinai in 2007, Dr. Filizola has supervised 12 postdoctoral and 11 graduate and undergraduate female scientists.

The Filizola Laboratory uses a number of cutting-edge computational tools and approaches, including molecular modeling, bioinformatics, cheminformatics, molecular dynamics simulations, enhanced sampling algorithms, free-energy perturbations, and artificial intelligence and machine learning. Dr. Filizola's team has devoted special effort to the subfamily of opioid receptors to discover novel painkillers with reduced side effects. Her lab also works toward the discovery of novel therapeutics to treat renal, hematologic, neoplastic, bone, and/or fibrotic diseases.

Dr. Filizola has received numerous awards and honors, and her work has consistently been supported by grants from the National Institutes of Health. In her role as Dean of the Graduate School of Biomedical Sciences at Icahn Mount Sinai, she participates in all school-wide decisions and strategic planning related to graduate education and postdoctoral training, all while maintaining the highest academic and ethical standards for the Graduate School of Biomedical Sciences faculty and trainees.

Dr. Filizola earned her PhD from the Second University of Naples in Italy. She did her postdoctoral work at the Molecular Research Institute in Mountain View. California. and at Icahn Mount Sinai.

Patricia Kovatch



Patricia Kovatch joined the Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai as the founding Dean for Scientific Computing and Data in 2011. She is a tenured Professor in the Departments of Genetics and Genomic Sciences and Pharmacological Sciences.

Her arrival at Mount Sinai immediately elevated the institution's computational and data ecosystem to a level beyond what most medical centers could imagine. These new data analytic capabilities helped Mount Sinai to usher in an era of precision medicine, bringing Mount Sinai recognition from the *New York Times, Wired* and *Fast Company*. Dean Kovatch and her multi-disciplinary team of experts at the intersection of technology, biomedical science and medicine, have enabled multi-scale, Al-powered science through close collaborations with researchers and clinicians across the Mount Sinai Health System. These partnerships support over \$100 million in NIH-funded computational and data science research per year, resulting in over 1,500 publications over the last 10 years and has enabled new research funding.

As a Principal Investigator (PI), Dean Kovatch has been continuously funded by the National Institutes of Health (NIH) since 2014. She has received multiple NIH equipment awards from the Office of the Director for high-performance computing and data infrastructure that have accelerated research and discovery and reduced cost for Mount Sinai. She was awarded a training grant from the National Institute for Biomedical Imaging and Bioengineering for the Community Research Education and Engagement for Data Science. She is also the PI and Director for the Data Repository and Management Core for the National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences' Human Health Exposure Analysis Resource.

Before coming to Mount Sinai, Dean Kovatch previously served as the director of an institute for computational science for the National Science Foundation at a Department of Energy national laboratory. This institute deployed the third fastest supercomputer in the world in 2009.

I. Michael Leitman, MD, FACS



Medical Leitman, MD, is a Professor in the departments of Surgery and Medical Education and Dean for Graduate Medical Education at the Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai. He also serves on the Didactic (Teaching) Faculty of the Graduate School of Biomedical Sciences and as a Course Co-Director for GME Residents and Fellows Leadership Program at Icahn Mount Sinai. Additionally, Dr. Leitman is Vice Chairman of the Department of Surgery and Chief of General Surgery at Mount Sinai Beth Israel. He previously held the position of Site Chairman of the Department of Surgery at Mount Sinai Beth Israel.

Dr. Leitman is renowned as an innovator of minimally invasive techniques for the treatment of abdominal conditions. He is also known for his research on the outcomes following the surgical treatment of breast cancer, colon cancer, lower gastrointestinal hemorrhage, gallbladder disease, and morbid obesity.

A fellow of the New York Academy of Medicine, Dr. Leitman has been recognized as a Harold C. Case Scholar and Commonwealth Scholar. He is also a fellow of the American College of Surgeons and the Society of Surgical Oncology. He is a member of the American Board of Colon and Rectal Surgery, and the Society for Surgery of the Alimentary Tract, where he serves as a member of the Continuing Education Committee. He is the author of more than 200 peer-reviewed scientific articles, book chapters, and published abstracts. He is on the editorial board of 20 surgical journals.

Dr. Leitman was elected to Phi Beta Kappa and the Alpha Omega Alpha honor societies. He was the recipient of the 2008 Murry G. Fischer Distinguished Educator Award from Beth Israel. Since 2013, Dr. Leitman has been included in *New York Magazine*'s (Castle Connolly) list of Top Doctors. In 2022, he received the Mount Sinai Faculty Council Lifetime Achievement Award.

A native of Philadelphia, Dr. Leitman received both his bachelor's degree and Medical Degree from Boston University. He did his postdoctoral training in surgery at New York-Presbyterian's Weill Cornell campus before completing his fellowship in surgical critical care at North Shore University Hospital on Long Island. While at Cornell, Leitman was under the tutelage of American surgical pioneer G. Tom Shires, MD.

Jessica R. Moise, BA, is the Grants and Contracts Officer and the Senior Associate Dean for Sponsored Programs at the Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai. In her three decades in research administration, she has effectively managed the complexity of Icahn Mount Sinai's prodigious growth and the rapidly changing scope of its research capabilities. These traits have made her a sought-after thought leader by the federal government.

Ms. Moise's work is crucial to the processing of Icahn Mount Sinai's institutional funding sources. In her role as Grants and Contracts Officer at Icahn Mount Sinai, she oversees and acts as the institutional signatory for more than \$600 million annually in Sponsored Programs awards, including \$463 million per year in funding from the National Institutes of Health. Nationally, Icahn Mount Sinai ranks 14th in NIH grant awards to Medical Schools.

Ms. Moise is responsible for hiring, training, and supervising a Grants and Contracts Office staff of 30 people in all areas of pre-awards grants administration. She also creates and enforces institutional policy, presents to senior leadership on grant-related topics, and implements electronic submission software and its processes. Additionally, she represents Icahn Mount Sinai at the Federal Demonstration Partnership and Commons Working Group, a cooperative initiative among 10 federal agencies and more than 200 institutional recipients of federal funds.

Ms. Moise has used her expertise in navigating the NIH grants system to deliver numerous presentations at regional, national, and international meetings of the Society of Research Administrators. She has also presented at the NIH's Yearly Grants Management Specialist Training program. Ms. Moise is a member of the Society of Research Administrators International, the Federal Demonstration Partnership, the Institutional Dual Use Research of Concern Committee, and other standard institutional committees and working groups such as Export Control, Research Administration, and Research Compliance. She previously served on the Academic Review Board at the *Journal of Research Administration*.

Ms. Moise began her career at Icahn Mount Sinai as a Study Coordinator in Neurology, where she was responsible for handling all administrative and regulatory aspects of the Neuro-AIDS Research Program, including adverse event reporting. She also handled a variety of NIH applications and assisted Principal Investigators in preparing consents, protocols, and case report forms.

Ms. Moise earned her BA in Psychology from Eugene Lang College in New York City.

Ramon Parsons, MD, PhD, is an Icahn Scholar, the Director of The Tisch Cancer Institute, the Ward-Coleman Chair in Cancer Research, and a Professor and Chairman of the Department of Oncological Studies at the Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai. He is also the Director of the Mount Sinai Tisch Cancer Center for the Mount Sinai Health System.

Dr. Parsons is a highly acclaimed researcher in cancer genetics, with an emphasis on breast cancer. His research goals include identifying the genetic and biochemical changes that lead normal cells to develop into aggressive cancer cells. He made a seminal finding when he discovered a tumor suppressor gene that is often mutated in cancer called PTEN. Dr. Parsons showed that PTEN is part of the PI3 kinase signaling pathway and determined that genes from this pathway are frequently altered in breast and other cancers. This foundational work led to FDA approval of therapy targeting this pathway for patients with metastatic breast cancer. His original paper identifying PTEN has been cited thousands of times.

Dr. Parsons has authored more than 150 peer-reviewed articles and book chapters and mentored more than 40 trainees. He is the recipient of multiple honors, including the American Association for Cancer Research (AACR)'s Outstanding Investigator Award for Breast Cancer Research, the National Cancer Institute Outstanding Investigator Award, and the National Institutes of Health Research Service Award.

Dr. Parsons is a member of the AACR, the National Academy of Medicine, the American Society for Clinical Investigation, and the Association of American Physicians. He was Chair of the AACR Special conferences committee for two terms from 2011-2017; the committee initiated and planned more than 75 scientific meetings on different cancer-related topics. He is a past and current recipient of grant support for several projects and a member of the NCI Cancer Centers Study Section.

Dr. Parsons joined Icahn Mount Sinai in 2013. He earned his MD and PhD from the State University of New York at Stony Brook and did his postdoctoral fellowship at Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine. He was a professor at Columbia University Medical Center before joining Mount Sinai.

Bruce E. Sands, MD, MS



Bruce E. Sands, MD, MS, is the Dr. Burrill B. Crohn Professor of Medicine at the Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai and the Chief of the Dr. Henry D. Janowitz Division of Gastroenterology at the Mount Sinai Health System.

Dr. Sands is an expert in the management of inflammatory bowel diseases (IBD) and has earned an international reputation for his care of patients with complex and refractory disease. He is widely recognized for his innovative treatment of Crohn's disease and ulcerative colitis and for his expertise in the clinical investigation of new therapeutics. His earliest clinical trial work was with infliximab, a chimeric monoclonal anti-tumor, necrosis-factor antibody that has revolutionized the treatment of Crohn's disease. Dr. Sands was among the first to report on the efficacy of infliximab in ulcerative colitis, which was later borne out in large, randomized, controlled trials.

His research also explores IBD epidemiology and includes the creation of a population-based cohort of IBD in Rhode Island, a project funded by both the National Institutes of Health and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Dr. Sands has served as an Associate Editor for the journal *Gastroenterology*, and has published nearly 300 original manuscripts in leading journals such as *Gut*, *Gastroenterology*, and the *American Journal of Gastroenterology*. He was the lead investigator of the landmark studies ACCENT 2, UNIFI, and VARSITY, which were published in the *New England Journal of Medicine*; and SEAVUE, which was published in *The Lancet*.

Dr. Sands is a past Chair of the Clinical Research Alliance of the Crohn's & Colitis Foundation of America. He also served as Chair of the Immunology, Microbiology and Inflammatory Bowel Disease Section of the American Gastroenterological Association. Additionally, he was the Chair of the International Organization for the Study of IBD. In 2016, Dr. Sands was awarded the Dr. Henry Janowitz Lifetime Achievement Award from the Crohn's & Colitis Foundation, that organization's highest honor.

Dr. Sands earned his MD from Boston University and trained in internal medicine at the Hospital of the University of Pennsylvania. After completing GI fellowship at the Massachusetts General Hospital (MGH), he joined the faculty at Harvard Medical School and served as the Acting Chief of the Gastrointestinal Unit at MGH before moving to Mount Sinai in 2010.

Swan N. Thung, MD, FAASLD



Swan N. Thung, MD, is a Professor of Pathology, a Founding Member of the Mount Sinai Liver Cancer Research Program, and an Associate Member of The Tisch Cancer Institute at the Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai. She is also an attending pathologist at the Mount Sinai Health System.

Dr. Thung is an esteemed researcher who specializes in pathology, with a special focus on liver pathology, immunopathology, and liver cancer. Her research interests range from acute processes to chronic liver diseases associated with fibrosis, cirrhosis, and malignancies.

Dr. Thung has spent her entire career at Icahn Mount Sinai and the Mount Sinai Health System. She was part of the team that started the Liver Pathology Division. The following year, Icahn Mount Sinai began offering a Liver Pathology Fellowship program under Dr. Thung's direction. It is believed to be the only Liver Pathology Fellowship program of its kind in the world.

Dr. Thung has helped steer the Liver Cancer Research Program since its inception in 2003, transforming it into a world leader. She has authored or co-authored two books, along with more than 400 peer-reviewed articles, 150 book chapters, and 140 abstracts. She serves on the editorial boards of numerous medical journals. Dr. Thung has mentored 35 trainees, including several Visiting Fellows who were drawn to the excellence of the Liver Pathology programs at Mount Sinai under her stewardship. Many of those Visiting Fellows now hold prestigious research positions throughout the world.

In 2014, the American Association for the Study of Liver Diseases elected Dr. Thung as a Fellow. Residents at Icahn Mount Sinai bestowed her with their Senior Pathology Faculty Recognition Award in 2015. In March 2022, she received the Lifetime Achievement Award from the Hans Popper Hepatopathology Society. For several years running, Dr. Thung has been recognized as a Top Doctor by *New York Magazine* (Castle Connolly). She has been named one of the Exceptional Women in Medicine every year from 2017 to 2022.

Dr. Thung received her MD from the University of Indonesia Medical School in Jakarta, Indonesia. She did her postdoctoral training at the Catholic Medical Center of Brooklyn and Queens, the Veterans Administration Medical Center in the Bronx, and at Icahn Mount Sinai.
